PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

2012 has been a year of challenges and successes for Quandialla Central School. The long term trend of declining student enrolments continued into 2012, with significant reductions in the number of children enrolled at the school. A number of families relocated to other towns; a number of Year 6 students exited the school and sought enrolment at high schools in nearby towns, and a number of secondary students exited the school to seek employment or to enrol in TAFE courses.

These are the same factors that affect all small schools in the Western Region. Combined with the significant demographic changes and the changes in the regional economy, the result is a real impact on small schools and their communities.

As a result, the classes at the school are very small, particularly in the secondary school. During 2012, the school maintained two discreet class groups in the primary – a Kindergarten to Year 1 class and a Year 3 to Year 6 class. Both classes were taught by full time teachers, with additional teachers employed to form Stage based groups in Literacy and Numeracy.

This organisation proved to be successful, with students from both K, 1-2 and 3-6 classes continuing to achieve sound results in external testing and assessment programs. Importantly, students in both classes continued to grow in literacy and numeracy at rates which are comparable with similar schools.

However, as the trend in student enrolments continues into 2013, the primary school will need to be r e-organised. While there will be some changes to class organisation, the school will continue to run Stage based groups in Literacy and Numeracy across the primary school.

During Semester 1, the school was advised by the School Education Director that there will not be any changes to the structure of the school. That is, the secondary school will continue to operate in 2013 and beyond. This advice was very reassuring for the school and families, and provides families with certainty in relation to planning educational pathways for their children.

During 2012 the secondary school continued to participate in the Lachlan Access Program. This enables students in Year 11 and 12 to access a very broad range of subjects and Vocational Education and Training courses. In fact, students at Quandialla Central School have access to a secondary curriculum that offers more subjects and choice than most large high schools.

As part of the Lachlan Access Program, the secondary teachers at Quandialla Central School are actively involved in delivering Stage 6 courses to students in several other schools. Our students are members of a "class" that is made up of students from as many as five other schools. The lessons are delivered via connected classrooms, using videoconferencing and linked Smartboards. The secondary school will continue to actively participate in LAP for 2013 and beyond.

Throughout 2012, our students continued to achieve success in academic, sporting and co-curricular areas. Later in this yearbook are the reports on our students' success in Athletics, Swimming, Debating, Public Speaking, Vocational Education, Workplace Learning, and academic areas.

The tradition of Quandialla Central School students progressing from school to district, from District to Regional and then to State levels in representative sport and co-curricular areas continued throughout 2012. I especially congratulate the students and thank their families for their strong support in these areas.

Other significant changes occurred during 2012. The School Certificate credential was replaced with the Record of Student Achievement. This supports the State government's legislation that raised the school leaving age to 17 years. The Higher School Certificate credential continues, and Quandialla Central School will continue to offer the HSC curriculum for secondary students.

The school continued to implement the Positive Behaviour for Learning Framework. PBL has become the framework of core values and expected behaviours for our students and school. Our PBL core values are Respectful, Responsible, Learners and our behaviour expectations are specifically taught to students in PBL lessons.

During Semester two, the major change was the significant re-alignment and re-structuring of the State and Regional levels of the Department of Education, and the resulting changes in levels of support for schools. This resulted from State government decisions and policies. Groups replaced Regions, and schools will transition to local management under Local Schools Local Decisions. The process continues and is expected to be finalised by late 2014.

On reflection, throughout 2012 Quandialla Central School has met the challenges and continued to provide a very high quality education for all of our students. Our students have continued to achieve notable successes in all fields of learning and co-curricular activities. Our parents and families have been the foundation that supports the school.

I wish to congratulate our students on their many successes in 2012, and extend sincere thanks to parents, families, teachers and administration and support staff for their contributions to our students' success during 2012. This truly reflects our school motto "*Together we provide opportunities for success*".

I wish you all a happy and peaceful summer holiday, and look forward to continued success in 2013.







YEARS 3/4/5/6

The Years 3/4/5/6 class has had a busy year with Mrs Robinson and Mrs Blackwood sharing some of the teaching and Mrs Harvey working with Stage 2 Maths. Students all performed poems for Recitation Day and participated in the Premier's Spelling Bee. A number of students completed the Premier's Reading Challenge and our Debating Team won their zone in the Western Challenge Debating Competition. There were a number of individual successes in public speaking and in the sporting arena.

This year saw the introduction of the laptops into the classroom. The laptops have been a valuable tool with the latest software. The students had workshops in Adobe Captivate, Adobe Photoshop with the National Partnerships Connected Learning Coach, Mrs Jillian Thring, and more recently have been working with Acrobat Pro 9. The laptops have been a tremendous asset to the room. Students have been able to word process their writing, type spelling words, do internet research and have access to educational programs like Study Ladder, Mathletics and ZooWhiz.

In weekly lessons, in the Positive Behaviour for Learning Program (PBL), our core values of being respectful, responsible, learners were explicitly taught. Students participated in role plays, and discussions about expected behaviours in specific settings around the school.

For most students the highlight of each week has been woodwork with Mr Parlett. Woodwork started as a one off reward for PBL but Mr Parlett enjoyed having the class so much and the class enjoyed the experience immensely that it was decided to make this a long term arrangement pending appropriate behaviour. The students initially all made a climbing gingerbread man, and then some went on to make a jewellery box or a toy truck. This term most students are making decorative Christmas or garden pieces.

The class studied Endangered Environments in a CAP Collie, our democratic government system in Making Informed Choices, Being Australian, including the inland explorers of Australia, and Growth and Change.

The class and school had visits from the Aspire UNSW, the Police to talk about bullying, Musica Viva and the Life Education Van.

The Canberra Excursion in October was a great success. Students enjoyed seeing Parliament House, the War Memorial, The Mint, Questacon, The National Museum, The Australian Institute of Sport and going ice skating.

Art with Mrs Blackwood has been fun this year. Students have recently made cane baskets. Throughout the year they have been engaged in Waste to Art, clay sculpture, charcoal sketching, collage and other multimedia works.





QUANDIALLA DEBATING REPORT - 2012

Quandialla Central School's Debating Team has once again brought great honour to themselves and their school in winning all the debates in their Zone Competition and competing for the second year in the inter-zone playoff. This result is remarkable on two levels: they competed in each debate against full primary schools from large towns, schools which had the choice of several classes of year six students, and their team consisted of one fourth and one fifth class student and only two from sixth class – the youngest team in the Western Challenge. Tiffany Penfold, Britney Troy, Emma Dixon and Sarah Penfold have made huge steps in their success in inter-school competition and in their own personal development.

The team proved their mastery over Parkes, Forbes North and Middleton Primary. Their topics were on the environment and our efforts to preserve it, the abolition of zoos and the health of our nation. They took an affirmative role twice and also experienced debate by video conferencing. In their inter-zone debate at Bathurst, they took on the topic 'that all children should learn a foreign language', and although they didn't convince the adjudicator, their argument was so strong that either side could have won the debate. This team displayed modesty in victory and grace in defeat. They hosted their guests to after-competition refreshments and gained so much more than arguing skills. They have provided their school and community with the role model of a team which achieves way beyond their age levels and continued the pattern of success established by last year's team. The sixth class students have trained up two younger debaters who will lead next year's effort.

NEWS FROM YEAR 7

English

Natasha began the year by reading the novel Hatchet and looking at the idea of Survival as a theme, finding links between the novel and other texts. Through this, she created her own brochure for survival in the wilderness, with information with what to do for food, water and shelter if lost in the wilderness.

In Term 2, Natasha did a close study of poetry, learning to analyse poetry and learn poetic techniques. The poetry studied was by Aboriginal poets and all focused on the ideas of "Difference and Diversity." Natasha spent a lot of time looking at the biographies of the poets to study how their personal experiences had affected their writing. She then finished off the term with a film study of the Disney film, Tangled, looking at film techniques, the use of music in the film and comparing the structure of the film with that of other Disney films to see if there are common features amongst them.

In Term 3, students did a study of Media, focusing on Radio and Pop Culture. We studied several popular radio shows, looking at the type of content they discussed and the timeslot and audience they were focusing on. Natasha looked at the history of the radio and the role of the media in controlling pop culture. We then finished off the term by working to create her own radio show with the help of the other Secondary students, the "NJTMA Show", which was played at the end of term assembly.

Term 4 was started by looking at Myths and Legends, looking at different myths and legends from around the world. She then moved on to a unit on Drama, looking in detail at dramatic techniques, the metalanguage and layout of a script and how to write a monologue.

History

Natasha began the year by looking at the basic skills needed for studying history, such as analysing sources. She finished off the term by creating a diary for an ancient world of her own creation and writing it as a famous archaeologist that had just discovered this lost world. This required creating sources and analysing them for historical evidence.

In Term 2, Year 7 looked at Ancient Egypt, learning about the way people lived back then. Natasha then completed a project looking at several different Pharaohs of Ancient Egypt and planning her own fictional trip to Egypt to see all the sites.

Term 3 was all about Ancient Greece. In addition to learning about life in Ancient Greece, there was a particular emphasis on Greek Gods and mythology, a subject that Natasha was very interested in.

In Term 4, students learned about Medieval Europe, including the Black Death which plagued Europe. They studied the feudal system which governed the land at the time, and also learned about real life castles and knights and what life was like. To complete the term, Natasha was able to look in depth at notable figures from the time, including Joan of Arc.

Geography

In Semester 1, Natasha studied Global Change, looking at the ideas of Globalisation, and comparing living standards between Australia and other countries around the world. She completed a country comparison study between Australia and Nigeria, as well as learning skills with reading and using an atlas and direction skills.

In Semester 2, she looked at the idea of Global Issues and the Role of Citizenship. Besides looking at what does it mean to be a global citizen, she looked at tourism and threatened habitats, including an assignment on the threatened habitats of the orang-utan. She also completed skill activities on scale, map reading and grid references.

Science (Year 7)

Natasha started the year with an introduction to Science, learning the rules of the lab and the equipment and apparatus involved, and how to write up simple experiments. She then moved on to cells, about the history of scientific research regarding cells and the history and development of the microscope. Students studied the components, and the difference between plants and animal cells. They completed practical experiments with microscopes.

Year 7 then learned about Humans, looking at the organs and tissues that make up the human body and systems such as the digestive, respiratory and systems that help us live. Looking at diet and the carbohydrates, proteins, minerals and that are found in what we eat. Natasha then researched diseases caused by nutritional imbalance and deficiencies.

Students then moved on to studying microbes, and examined the distinguishing characteristics of different microbes. They performed experiment on antiseptics and the effect of microbes in bread and yoghurt making. Year 7 then learned how to classify all living things according to their structural features, using the Dichotomous Key.

In a unit on astronomy, Natasha studied models of the universe, and did demonstrations to compare quality and relative sizes and distances of planets. She specifically looked at the structure of the earth and cycles that occur on earth. Practical activities included rock samples and identification.

Year 7 finished off the year by looking at ecosystems- comparing different organisms, environments they live in and their interactions with each other.

Maths

In maths, Year 7 began the year looking at data- graphs, spreadsheets, phenomena; before moving on to the study of Number, including the order of operations, time, rates and ratios.

Students then studied length, which covered perimeter, surface area, volume, and area. In a study of algebra, equations and factorisation were studied before moving on to Trigonometry and angles.

Topics studied in Terms 2 and 3 included consumer arithmetic, geometry, coordinate geometry and graphs and probability. The year was finished off by revisiting those topics that the students had difficulty with throughout the year.

Technology Mandatory - Textiles

Year 7 students worked on the topic 'Carry Bags' which was the major project for Semester one Technology classes. Natasha designed a bag to carry her DER laptop and school books. As part of this project students learnt about Design and the design process as well as learning a number of machine skills and techniques specific to Technology and Textiles. Semester two involved the use of different Computer Programs suitable for use in Technology projects and Designing. The Project topic for this semester was to research and make a 'Personal Scrapbook' using technology and a selection of recycled materials.

NEWS FROM YEAR 9

English

Year 9 spent Term 1 studying the theme of "Being Australian", which included watching the film Australia and a novel study, Deadly Unna? and analysing which was a more accurate depiction of life in Australia and the Australian Identity.

In Term 2, students completed a study of Shakespearean Drama and Transformation, studying the play Twelfth Night and comparing it with the modern adaptation, the film She's the Man. Students then cast their own adaptation of the play, with some very interesting choices.

Term 3 was started with a close study of poetry, focusing on the ideas of "Memories and Moments" and the significance of this. We then finished off with a short unit on Magazines and Advertising, where Theresa created her own magazine, a music magazine she called Pulse.

In Term 4, Theresa wrote a short story called "Wish you were here" in a short Creative Writing unit. She learned about narrative structure and the importance of detail when writing short stories. She then moved on to documentaries, which involves studying different types of documentaries, and examining their purpose, audience and techniques.

History

Term 1 was spent looking at life in Australia prior to World War 1, from the time of Federation in 1901. Students learned about federation, the Constitution and women's right to vote. They then analysed photos from the era to study what life was like in Australia in the early 1900s.

In Term 2, students looked at World War 1 and Australia's involvement. A lot of emphasis was given to the Gallipoli campaign and the creation of the ANZAC Legend. This culminated in Year 9 creating a mock Facebook profile for an ANZAC soldier and Gallipoli. This was a good exercise in historical empathy for the students, having to think about what they had learned about life in the Gallipoli trenches and what soldiers might have posted if they did have Facebook back in 1915.

Term 3, we studied life between World Wars One and Two, in particular looking at the experiences of a group (the Stolen Generation), a political event and an event that defined the decades. Theresa was especially interested and intrigued by the death of Phar Lap. This was mostly an independent study, with Theresa completing much of the research on her own.

In Term 4, Theresa studied World War Two, especially looking at how Australia's role changed throughout the role and how we began to rely upon the United States for support as an ally, rather than Britain. Students looked at the fall of Singapore and the number of Australians taken as POWs at the time, as well as learning about Kokoda and the sinking of the HMAS Sydney.

Geography

Year 9 spent Semester 1 looking at Investigating Australia's Physical Environments, the physical characteristics that make Australia unique and the natural history of Australia. They also looked at natural hazards and the effect they have on the land. They also learned skills with reading and using an atlas and direction skills.

In Semester 2, they studied Changing Australian Communities and how they are shaped by Geographical Issues. They examined the types of communities and developed their skills on scale, map reading and grid references.

Science

In Science this year, Year 9 first studied cells, DNA and biotechnology- cellular replication, cell theory, and how DNA transfers genetic information from one generation to the next. They then moved on to the study of the atom- identifying distinguishing difference between atoms and molecules, elements and compounds. This included studying the Periodic table and making models of atoms.

Students then completed an assessment task; which consisted of an open ended investigation, major research project where students designed and constructed an appropriate experiment. They then moved on to study coordination and control of the body, looking specifically at the interaction between coordination systems in maintaining humans as functioning organisms.

Theresa then looked at chemical reactions and was involved first hand investigations of reactants, producing chemical reactions. When studying the Earth, Year 9 differentiated between the Earth and other heavenly bodies. They constructed models of the earth and researched natural events that happen on earth and their impact, such as plate tectonics.

Year 9 finished off the year by looking at ecosystems- comparing different organisms, environments they live in and their interactions with each other.

Maths

In maths, Year 9 began the year looking at data- graphs, spreadsheets, phenomena; before moving on to the study of Number, including the order of operations, time, rates and ratios.

Students then studied length, which covered perimeter, surface area, volume, and area. In a study of algebra, equations and factorisation were studied before moving on to Trigonometry and angles.

Topics studied in Terms 2 and 3 included consumer arithmetic, geometry, coordinate geometry and graphs and probability. The year was finished off by revisiting those topics that the students had difficulty with throughout the year.

Year 9 Textiles

This year the students have worked on the topic of 'Introduction to Project Work', generating and developing ideas on the Textile, focus areas of Non – Apparel and Textile Arts.

Semester 1 saw, Theresa and Taren designed and created a carry bag for a specified purpose and combined all the skills of Designing, Producing and Evaluating a Textiles project. Taren successfully produced a Hip-Bag for his Ipod and Theresa an all purpose Shoulder/Overnight Bag. The students presented a Portfolio Folder which is an essential part of the Textiles Technology Course.

During Semester 2 Student worked on the Focus Area – 'Textile Art'. These are items that are highly decorative. Theresa designed and created using a range of techniques a Personal Scrap Book.

NEWS FROM YEAR 11

English

Year 11 began the year with the topic "Voices of War", looking at poetry, songs and short stories written about war and the perspective they have on war and what it represents. This included poetry from World War Two as well as modern songs that focus on the tragedy of war.

Term 2 was focused on studying Alfred Hitchcock's film Psycho, which both students enjoyed. Matt and Ryan both learned a lot about voyeurism and the effect it has on the film. They learned about techniques such as mise-en-scene and finished off the term by creating their own film poster for Psycho, aimed at a specific audience type of their own choosing.

Term 3 was a novel study of the novel Raw, and looking at the idea of Change. Students studied the novel and looked at the idea of change throughout the story and then compared it with the idea of change in other texts, such as the film Shrek.

In Term 4, Students have began their HSC course by looking at the idea of Belonging, that is presented in the poetry of Peter Schrzynecki and comparing that with ideas in other texts of their own choosing. Ryan and Matt used their knowledge to create their own "Belonging walls" a collage of quotes, pictures and ideas that sum up their interpretation of Belonging.

Ancient History

Matt began the year by looking at Investigating the Past: History, Archaeology and Science and how all these aspects are important to create an accurate picture of what happened in history to civilisations no longer around.

Term 2 was about studying Ancient Egypt and specifically the life, reign, death and tomb of the boy king, the Pharaoh Tutankhamen. Students created a life-size model of his tomb on the school oval and spent much time investigating his tomb and the artefacts inside it.

In Term 3, Matt studied the Egyptian village of Deir el Medina and looked in depth about what life in the village was like. He then created a historical empathy task, where he created a series of diary entries from the perspective of one of the villagers, depicting all aspects of life from the sources studied throughout the term.

In Term 4, Matt investigated the Roman towns of Pompeii and Herculaneum that were both destroyed by the volcano Vesuvius and what life was like prior to the eruption that destroyed both towns.

Music

Matt is part of a LAP Music class which started the year with another student at Ungarie and quite a few others at Condobolin. The students all play guitar and most of them sing. The three topics that they studied in Year 11 were Methods of Notation, Popular Music and Rock Music. All students performed, composed their own music, researched specific areas of the topics and presented a number of 10 minute viva voces (live talking), as well as wrote about the concepts of music in a wide variety of listening examples.

Visual Arts

Ryan is studying this subject, which has equal theory and practical components. He has looked at individual artists' case studies and worked on a Body of Work, which also includes keeping a Visual Arts Process Diary to record all comments on the progress and making of a Body of Work.

Hospitality – Kitchen Operations

This year has introduced a very different method of teaching and receiving lessons for the Certificate II Hospitality – Kitchen Operations Course. Students have been enrolled for the first time via the Lachlan Access Program from Ungarie Central School to study via a combination of Video Conference, Moodle lessons and Block Practical in our new Trade Training Kitchen.

Each Term the students from both schools combine to share lessons face to face to complete the required course competencies in the industry kitchen at Quandialla Central School.

Theresa, is also a Hospitality student with a difference in that she is only in year nine at Quandialla Central School but has enrolled in the full HSC Course studying early entry to the Hospitality Subject.

She has successfully fulfilled the Preliminary year completing all the requirements as well as a very successful industry work placement at Cafe de Jour in Young.

Students are often asked to cater for school and community functions to assist them to further develop their course skills for the HSC. Events such as, The Biggest Morning Tea, The P & C Dinner, staff lunches, and Grain Corp functions.

It is obvious that the students enjoy their course and are always keen to experience new skills and opportunities that are offered to them. Their recent Practical assessment in the Training Kitchen saw the student present dishes to a high standard.







Hospitality Lessons at Quandialla Central School

On Thursday, 31st May, Hospitality Students from Ungarie Central School joined with the Quandialla students to participate in a Lachlan Access Program (LAP) Hospitality lesson at Quandialla Central School in the Trade Training Centre. As part of the Hospitality Kitchen Operation Course the students are required to know how to disjoint and truss whole chickens for the 'Food Preparation' unit. During the day Mrs Noble (LAP Hospitality teacher) and Mrs Wason (subject co-teacher) from Ungarie Central School, instructed the students on how to prepare, cook and serve a variety of chicken dishes using the chickens they had prepared earlier in the session. Students also learnt about and used a range of methods of cookery to prepare the dishes. All students had an enjoyable day working together in the new Trade Trading Centre. Quandialla Central School students particularly enjoyed having the students from Ungarie Central School visit for the day.

Hospitality Training Day - Wagga

On Thursday, 19th July, the Hospitality class travelled to Wagga to participate in an Industry/Skills training day. Students from Quandialla and Ungarie Central Schools attended a 'hands on' two hour Coffee Appreciation Course, supplied by Wagga Catering Equipment, where they learnt new skills in the art of making and serving Espresso coffees. Each student received a formal certificate for their training and participation.

Staff also demonstrated the new technology and steps involved in operating a combi oven (heat, steam and pressure – all computerised). After a lunch break the students were given an extensive tour of the Knight's Meats store and it's operations. This involved delivery, storage, butchery, presentation/packaging and sales in meat, poultry, dairy and small goods. It was a very interesting and informative day for all the students. Excursions such as these give the students a realistic view of the different Hospitality Sectors and the Industry Standards required for food preparation as part of their training in Certificate II, Kitchen Operations.

The VET Hospitality Students while busily engaged in the learning of skills and knowledge in the classroom take time out throughout the year to practice their skills catering for special events and functions in and around the school. This year they have been involved in a number of special events, such as;

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION / SCHOOL TO WORK PROGRAMS

Work experience and Industry work placements are critical parts of the learning program for QCS secondary students. For students completing Stage 6 Vocational Education courses. Industry work placement is a mandatory component of the HSC course. We have a number of students studying Stage 6 Hospitality this year through the Lachlan Access Program with Ungarie Central School, directed and taught by Mrs Anne Noble.

Secondary students who complete Industry work placement and work experience programs learn the key work employability skills, which include; Communication, Teamwork, Problem solving, Initiative and enterprise, Planning and organising, self-management, Learning and technologies. It is interesting to note how important punctuality, personal presentation and initiative are to employers during these placements.

One of our students studying a VET Hospitality subject this year is Theresa Kessey in Year 9. Theresa spent one week completing her industry work placement at Café De Jour in Young. During the week, Theresa learnt and demonstrated food handling and preparation skills; food and customer service skills, and advanced cooking skills. Theresa assisted in the preparation and cooking of a la carte meals and also many specific kitchen operations tasks such as; mayonnaise, hollandaise sauce, and various chutneys to be served with red meats. By demonstrating these advanced skills, Theresa has achieved more competencies in the Preliminary Hospitality course, and progressing through the HSC course at an advanced rate.

The VET Hospitality students at Ungarie Central School access their theory lessons by way of a Moodle Program each week and their Ungarie co-teacher assists with the delivery of practical units until their assessments are conducted in the Industry Technology Classroom located at Quandialla Central School.

Our VET Industrial Technology student Ryan Forsyth also accesses his lessons via VC through the Lachlan Access Program from Condobolin High School. This year He completed his Industry work placement through Propellorhead IT, at young and has continued worked with the business developing his knowledge and skills for the course each Saturday.

Secondary students returned to their normal timetabled classes after their busy week of VET Industry work placements with a more realistic view of what is expected in the workplace, and quite often gain part time employment or future job opportunities as a result of their hard work and commitment

Employers and businesses that host our students for Industry work placements and work experience Programs are very valuable to the education and industrial skills experienced by our VET students. Businesses such as: Propellorhead IT, Café De Jour in Young and Ned's Café in Grenfell, Cafe Peckish in West Wyalong and The Central Hotel in Ungarie.

Careers and School to Work Program

Tertiary Awareness Day - Forbes

A Careers Day is held each year where students obtain information across a broad range of tertiary studies such as: University, Tafe, Defence Force and various job opportunities and study pathways. This year our senior secondary students in Years 9-11 enjoyed the Tertiary Awareness Day at The Red Bend Catholic College which was held on Tuesday, 22nd May. 
SECONDARY SPORT





CWA INTERNATIONAL DAY




